

ROSE-HULMAN



A double major allows a student to earn one bachelor's degree with two separate majors. When a student graduates with a double major, the graduate holds a degree in the primary program (listed first on the diploma) and has met the requirements for a second major (listed second on the diploma) in another program. A qualified student must complete all the requirements for a degree in the primary program.

Each department maintains the list of courses required to complete a second major for its corresponding programs. For ABET accredited programs, the set of courses used to satisfy the second major is required to meet at least the minimum curricular accreditation requirements for that program.

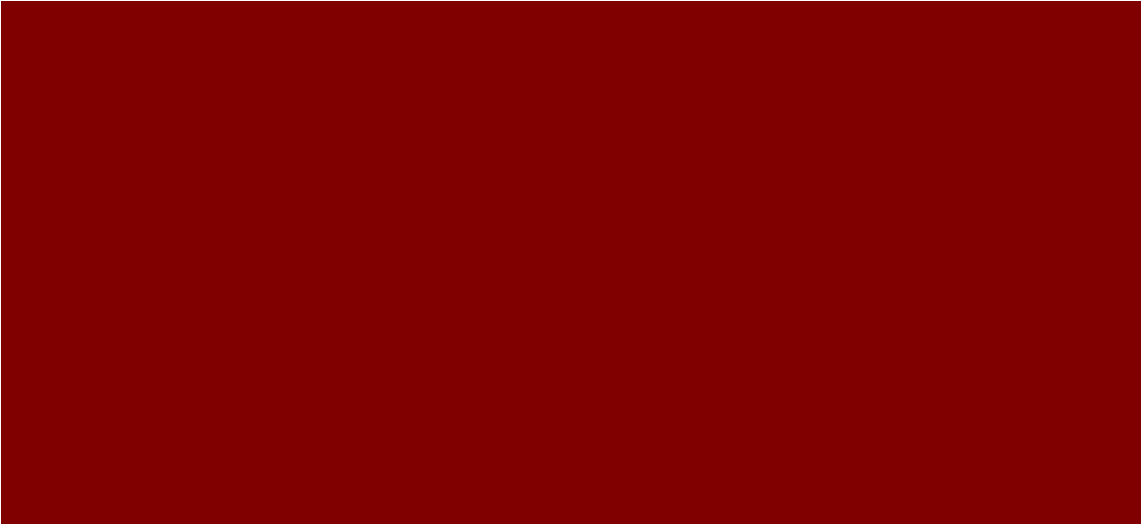
The impact of a double major applies to federal financial aid, state of Indiana financial aid and Rose-Hulman institutional financial aid. This would include Pell Grant, SEOG Grant, Indiana 21st Century Scholars Grant, Indiana Frank O'Bannon Grant, and State of Indiana Incentive Grants. All Rose-Hulman institutional financial aid (e.g., Rose-Hulman Merit Scholarship, Rose-Hulman Endowed Scholarships and Rose-Hulman Grants) can also be impacted.

Generally, a student realizes their aid has been impacted because all their financial aid has not been paid to their student account.

There are two important rules to remember with Double Majors. First, just like any other major, for federal and state of Indiana financial aid, all courses must apply towards a student's degrees to qualify for financial aid. Second, and probably the most important, a student must complete both majors at the same time. Once a student completes their first major, they are considered graduated and no longer eligible for their undergraduate financial aid. Students can reach out to the financial aid office to find out more about loan programs they would be eligible for in this situation.
